## **FOREWORD**

I am very pleased to be able to write the foreword to the new Parish Community Plan which sets out the main projects and initiatives that the Parish Council intends to undertake for the next five years.

First of all I want to thank the 400 or so residents of our Parish for taking the time to complete the questionnaire at the end of last year –these are not our plans and initiatives they are yours. I am also grateful for the hard work put in by the small group of my fellow Parish Councillors who designed the questionnaire, analysed the results and drafted the plan in the form we have today.

Some people may be wondering what the difference is between this plan and the recently approved Neighbourhood Plan, which we voted for at last year's referendum. Delivering one of the first completed Neighbourhood Plans in Mid Sussex has been your Parish Council's major achievement over the last few years and its value in preventing unwanted overdevelopment of our countryside has already been demonstrated. However it is a formal strategy and planning document setting out the policies which we have adopted to govern how our villages develop over the next twenty years. The Neighbourhood Plan sets out a vision

“to keep the village-feel of our community, and keep it a thriving and attractive Parish, a desirable place to live, work and visit. Our aim is to maintain, and where possible, improve the social, economic and environmental well-being of our area and the quality of life for all, now and in the future.”

This new Parish Community Life Plan based on your responses sets out how this vision will be fulfilled in practical terms over the next few years. For example the Parish Community Plan pays great attention to improving the social well-being and cohesion of our Parish by putting in place initiatives to bring residents of all ages together to support the more vulnerable members of our community.

We are now presenting this consultation version of the Plan to you for your consideration and comments. All contributions will be welcome but I would ask you, in giving your views, to remember that the Parish Council is working within very significant constraints on finance and resources. As you will see in the plan we have been able to achieve many of our objectives from previous plans. Our aim is to continue to plan to deliver only what is realistic although I am sure many of us would like to do much more if we could.

# INTRODUCTION

In December, last year, we delivered a Community Plan Questionnaire to houses in Hurstpierpoint, Sayers Common and Goddards Green.

We were really pleased to get over 400 responses (over 30% more than to the questionnaire we sent out in 2010). The answers and comments we received have helped us decide on our priorities for putting together this Community Life Plan, the purpose of which is to try to make life better for everyone who lives in the Parish.

Your Parish Council is the first tier of local government - the one that is closest to the people who live here and is in the best position to hear what our community feels would improve their quality of life.

Although we have limited powers and resources, we work with the other tiers, Mid Sussex District Council and West Sussex County Council, to try and achieve satisfaction for the majority of our residents.

The last five years have seen many of the things in our last Community Plan completed, with some of the long-term objectives still ongoing, and there have been a few additional things added after requests from the community. We have a list of projects that are in the pipeline and many of our aspirations for the future are outlined in our recently accepted Neighbourhood Plan, copies of which can be obtained from the Parish Council Office.

## **Successes completed during the last five years:**

- Hurstpierpoint's Village Garden has been enhanced by the inclusion of a sculpture celebrating the 700th anniversary of the St. Lawrence Fair and the rebuilding of the retaining wall;
- Sayers Common now has its Community Shop in the renovated Village Hall as well as a Boules Court in the Reeds Lane Recreation Ground;
- A Local Community Groups Event took place in Hurstpierpoint Village Centre;
- Seven benches were replaced and four new noticeboards were erected;
- Grants were given to many local groups and charities, including the Scouts, Sayers Common Village Hall, Hurst Festival and St Lawrence Fair.

## **Ongoing work (and continuing successes):**

- Replacing the street lights that we own with more energy efficient ones;
- Installing more new benches;
- Installing extra dog waste bins;

# INTRODUCTION continued

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- Traffic management schemes: to manage traffic speeds and parking from the High Street down Cuckfield Road to Chalkers Lane and the new housing developments;
- Traffic congestion, pedestrian safety and parking in College Lane will be investigated and where practical solutions implemented;
- Prevent additional traffic from the Burgess Hill Northern Arc development, and the proposed Business Park at Goddards Green on the A2300, from using Cuckfield Road and Malthouse Lane;
- Encourage the Local Planning Authority to review the existing Conservation Areas of Langton Lane, High Street and Hurst Wickham for possible modification and extension;
- The children's playground on the South Avenue Recreation Ground is having a complete makeover;
- Continuing support for the on-going development of the Willow Way Hub;
- Continuing support for the Improvement of the facilities at Fairfield Recreation Ground, owned and managed by Mid Sussex District Council;
- Continued funding of floral hanging baskets in the High Street;

- Maintaining our support for local groups protecting the flora and fauna in the parish.

*Tables showing how the actions detailed in the 2011 Parish Plan have progressed and a list of on-going projects can be found at the end of this document.*

We believe we have improved our communications with residents through our survey newsletters, our upgraded website and new noticeboards throughout the parish. This improvement in communication has been borne out by the responses to our questionnaire, with over 60% of respondents giving a favourable answer, but the also showed us that we still have a way to go.

# COMMUNICATIONS



## **CONTACT WITH OUR RESIDENTS**

Whilst we already circulate a quarterly newsletter to houses in the parish and regularly update our website, we will endeavour to further improve our contact with the public by making more use of social media and email.

**ACTION: Continue to improve communications with residents and organisations in the parish.**

## **MEETING YOUR COUNCILLORS**

The responses to our questionnaire showed support for the Parish Council to hold regular surgeries, where residents can talk to just one or two Parish Councillors instead of the full council at a public meeting. We will try to arrange locations in different parts of the parish to enable a programme of regular surgeries to take place. Although individual councillors cannot make decisions on their own, they can take residents' concerns back to the full Council for discussion.

Remember that all Parish Council meetings are open to the public and residents are invited to attend these to help them understand what their Parish Council does throughout the year.

**ACTION: Develop a programme of 'Councillor Surgeries' in locations around the parish.**



# THE COMMUNITY

## SETTING UP A YOUTH COUNCIL

The majority of respondents to our questionnaire believed that young people in the parish should have the chance to take a positive role in our future development because, as was said many times, they are the future. To this end we will investigate, together with young people themselves, the best way towards setting up a Youth Council for them to have some influence over the future, whilst also giving them an insight into the difficulties and delays that parish councils can often face in developing plans.



**ACTION:** *Take the necessary steps to contact young people to discuss the way forward in forming a Youth Council for Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common.*

## HELPING OLDER PEOPLE REMAIN SOCIALLY ACTIVE

We will explore more ways of encouraging local groups to work with older people to help them carry on an active social life. Some of the actions we can take include:

- Encouraging activities for older people;
- Encouraging opportunities for young people to assist older people who would like some help in using computers and the internet;
- Explore ways we can help older people to keep themselves safe and secure, including internet safety;

**ACTION:** *Inform residents of, and support, opportunities for older people.*

## THINKING ABOUT AND HELPING EACH OTHER

Our survey picked up the fact that there are lonely and isolated people in the parish. These are not, as one might imagine, just older people. There are residents of all ages, including young mothers with pre-school children, people with disabilities and carers who are not able to socialise with anyone outside of their own home. There is also a need for more education and understanding of the problems of dementia. We will explore ways of putting residents in touch with groups that can assist in dealing with all these problems. We will look at ways we can encourage residents to offer more help to people that live nearby who may have difficulties in carrying out everyday tasks such as shopping, especially in bad weather.

**ACTION:** *Inform residents of, and support, local groups that are able to help lonely and isolated people of all ages.*





# COMMUNITY SAFETY & ENFORCEMENT

## OUR POLICE

We are fortunate to live in a low crime area and have a very good relationship with our local Police and Community Support Officers. With the major reorganisation of policing in Sussex this year we aim to maintain this close contact we have had in recent years for the benefit of all our residents' safety and security.

We will support Police action in their fight against online, telephone and doorstep fraud.

**ACTION: Support action to make people aware and receive information about fraud.**



## COMMUNITY WARDENS

We will discuss with the responsible authorities the possibility of introducing Community Wardens in the area. The Community Warden Schemes' main priorities are to reduce litter and anti-social behaviour. They are the 'eyes and ears' of the community, providing a visible uniformed presence on the streets. Their aim is to make people feel safer, deter crime, tackle anti-social behaviour and help to keep their area clean and tidy

**ACTION: Enter discussions with the responsible authorities about introducing a Community Warden Scheme.**

## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEMES

Although this is operated by the police in conjunction with local residents, the Parish Council is ready to help in any way it can to spread the net more widely.

**ACTION: Explore ways to help extend Neighbourhood Watch schemes to cover the whole of the parish.**

# HOUSING

## HOUSING FOR LOCAL PEOPLE

New developments in the parish should all contain a specified number of affordable homes as a requirement for planning permission. Mid Sussex District Council decides who lives where when it comes to social housing, but we shall continue to press for allocations to be made to local people as a priority.

The Parish Council has the power to build and own properties to rent exclusively to local people but the construction and subsequent property management would prove costly and would inevitably lead to an increase in council tax for everyone (including those that live in them), therefore we will explore the possibility of such an investment. If it proves to be a viable proposition, no further action would be taken without full public consultation.



**ACTION: Consider ways that the Parish Council can help with delivering affordable housing and accommodation for local people and investigate costs involved with any such actions.**

# SHOPPING & EMPLOYMENT

## SHOPPING AND SERVICES IN THE HIGH STREET

The Parish Council will work closely with businesses in the High Street to assist in bringing more customers to their doors. This is not always easy and will not happen without concerted effort by all concerned.

**ACTION:** *Work closely with local businesses to make Hurstpierpoint a more attractive place to visit and shop.*

## ENABLING MORE EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

We aim to encourage an increase in employment opportunities in the parish. Our powers are limited but we shall do all we can to influence decision-makers and help open dialogue to create more business opportunities.

**ACTION:** *Explore ways in which the Parish Council can enable more employment opportunities in the parish.*



## MORE OFF-STREET PARKING

We will continue to look for ways to improve off-street parking. The costs involved, if and when a suitable site is found, would mean an increase in council tax.

## PARKING ENFORCEMENT

Unfortunately, this is not something we are able to do on our own. Mid Sussex District Council is responsible for enforcement of parking regulations, so we must work with them to find ways of combating illegal parking.

**ACTION:** *Continue the Parish Council's efforts to alleviate car parking problems in Hurstpierpoint.*





# COUNTRYSIDE & ENVIRONMENT

## **DEVELOPING OUR GREEN SPACES**

We shall continue to support the local Woodland Flora and Fauna Group and manage the ongoing development of the countryside in the parish, including the recently acquired 'Hurst Meadow'.

We shall also endeavour to merge the concepts of Quiet Lanes, a local heritage trail, and parkland footways into a connected network for enjoying the environment around the villages of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common, for the benefit of walkers, riders and cyclists.

**ACTION: Continue supporting the local Environmental Groups and manage the ongoing development and enjoyment of the countryside.**



## **ACTION ON THE ENVIRONMENT AND REDUCING OUR CARBON FOOTPRINT**

Nearly three quarters of Questionnaire respondents said that they were in favour of increasing solar panels on suitable large buildings in the parish. This will be encouraged by the Parish Council, to help reduce the carbon footprint by reducing power drawn from the National Grid. We shall also explore ways to encourage more people to cycle and walk safely to reduce the use of cars for short journeys.

**ACTION: Encourage energy saving and alternative power generation within the parish.**

## **COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

Finally, we are going to invite you to get involved in the future of our parish, we would like the parishioners themselves to take part in the implementation of this plan.

If any of these subjects are of real interest to you, contact your Parish Council to let us know you would like to participate in working towards a better future for the Parish of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common.

**ACTION: WE WANT YOU TO GET INVOLVED AND BE PART OF IT.**
